## Pearl Creek STEAM Night

The Pearl Creek STEAM Night was held again this year on Thursday, February 1. Design Alaska has participated with an infrared (IR) imaging demonstration for the past several Pearl Creek STEAM Nights. Taylor and Emory both have attended the STEAM night in the past as volunteers, and brought along an array of hot and cold items to display through IR imaging this year. As with previous years, the large IR camera was set up to display viewers enlarged on a TV. This year, the small point-and-shoot FLIR camera was brought to provide better access to the exhibit. Students and their families enjoyed seeing themselves in IR and learning more about the technology and how it can be used. Taylor Tharp from the structural department brought blocks of insulation and engineered joists as visual aids to explain IR imaging of common building materials. Many students particularly liked playing with snow in front of the camera, drawing with water, and cooling hands and faces to see the effect on screen. There were over 300 students and guests who came out on a 30 degree below zero night to take part in this event.









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### **President's Corner**

#### Office Language and Culture

We had an interesting observation today. In construction field crews, it isn't uncommon to hear 'bad language' used throughout the workday. Similarly, construction workers can be quite blunt when they deliver feedback. There is little beating about the bush if they don't like what is going on for quality or quantity of work. It seems to be part of the culture and relatively accepted part of day-to-day life.

In our professional office work, however, that same language would not be appropriate and would be quite offensive. Depending on the words used, it could even be grounds for possible disciplinary action. We have a different work culture that has different standards of acceptable behaviors.

Work culture can be quite different between industries and even company to company within the same industry. We have our own Design Alaska culture that influences our everyday work and interactions.

It is natural to see culture evolve over time, but it can be deliberately changed as well. A human resource trainer once shared that culture is the hardest thing to change and that it takes persistent effort and commitment by a group to make that change into its culture.

A good positive example I would like to share is the time for Production to prepare a package (X days). Many years ago we decided it was important to move our on-time delivery culture from the day of delivery to the client, to day of the delivery to Production. This was not easy, but we all worked at it together, and we could all see the results of work getting out the door on time, with production quality, and significantly less stress on everyone involved. This culture shift also led to Project Submittal Workup Sheets which is a good example of something that we are still working on.

Culture is everywhere and influences everything. If you have a positive example of culture being deliberately changed for the better, please share with me. If it is a great story, I will share in a future newsletter.

ALL BROWN MATERIALS IN THE BROWN - COLORED BIN.
